Rapid expansion: 468 hospitals empanelled under CGHS in 2025


189 Joined In
Delhi, Which
Has Most
Beneficiaries

New Delhi: The Central Govt Health Scheme (CGHS) has seen strong expansion in five years, with 468 hospitals empanelled under CGHS in 2025, far exceeding the 189 hospitals that exited the scheme during the same period. Official data tabled in Parliament showed that despite a rise in exits this year, the overall network has grown sharply, expanding treatment options for lakhs of govt employees and pensioners across the country.

A year-wise analysis highlights steady growth in the number of exits. In 2021, CGHS empanelled 266 hospitals, while 22 exited. Following year saw 275 additions and 20 exits. Expansion accelerated in 2023, when 398 hospitals were empanelled, though exits also

rose to 23. In 2024, 363 hospitals joined the network and 13 exited, marking relative stability. The year 2025 stands out for both record empanelment and highest exit count so far — yet still delivers largest net gain in five years.

Much of the expansion has come from large, high-demand states, Delhi, which probably is home to the highest number of CGHS beneficiaries, added 389 hospitals in 2025, reflecting both rising CGHS usage and the capital's dense private healthcare market. UP empanelled 62 hospitals, Rajasthan 31, Haryana 28, Maharashtra 20, and Bengal 18. These additions have significantly widened access, particularly in urban centres where CGHS footfall is heavy.

At the same time, exits have been concentrated in a handful of large states. UP

recorded 15 exits in 2025, which was around a third of the national number, followed by Karnataka (6), Maharashtra (5) and Delhi (3). Over the past five years, cumulative exits have reached 111 in Maharashtra and 11 in Delhi. Beneficiaries say even limited exits can cause disruption, forcing patients to change hospitals mid-treatment, repeat diagnostic tests or travel farther for

Madurai: The stone pillar-ashram atop Thirupparankundram hill near Madurai was built by Jain saints and does not belong to Hindus, Tamil Nadu govt told Madras high court on Monday, quoting books by archaeologists.

care — a particular burden for pensioners and those with chronic illnesses. Hospital groups argue that growth in empanelment does not automatically translate into stability. "The numbers show expansion, but retention depends on how smoothly hospitals are paid and how disputes are resolved," said Association of Healthcare Providers-India member Dr C M Bhagat.

He pointed out while revision of CGHS package rates on Oct 3, effective October 13, 2025, is a step forward, hospitals continue to face delayed reimbursements and deductions as key reasons for exiting. Health ministry has said CGHS wellness centres are opened based on demand and cashless treatment is already available to pensioners and other priority groups at empanelled hospitals.

As CGHS usage grows in more cities, experts say the challenge ahead is ensuring that rapid expansion is matched by hospital retention and continuity of care, so that beneficiaries experience not just a larger network, but a reliable one.

On reviving tourism, Omar said snowfall remains crucial. "A large section of tourists will not come to Kashmir till we get snow in Gulmarg, Pahalgam and Sonamarg," he said.

Shivraj Singh Chouhan, CM of Madhya Pradesh, on Monday demanded in Lok Sabha an apology from Congress for the slogan 'vote chor' (vote thief) and EC's special intensive revision pitch, saying both are exclusive to the party and not part of the opposition alliance's agenda.

"Every political party has the autonomy to set its agenda. Congress has chosen SIR and 'vote chor' as its main issues. It is Congress's choice," Omar said. "Who are we to tell them not to do it? We will oppose our losses, and we will choose theirs."

The National Conference vice-president, whose party as a constituent of the INDIA bloc, also declined to comment on the merits of NRI's chargesheet. Filed nearly eight months after the April 22 Pashalgam terrorist attack, "Now the decision will be taken by the court," Omar said. "I have always maintained that we should let the court decide."

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Apologise, says Rijiju; no anti-Modi slogan, says Cong

New Delhi: Parliamentary affairs minister Kiren Rijiju on Monday demanded in Lok Sabha an apology from Congress for the slogan 'vote chor' (vote thief) and EC's special intensive revision pitch, saying both are exclusive to the party and not part of the opposition alliance's agenda.

As soon as the House convened, Rijiju and political opponents of the INDIA bloc, including Congress, condemned the slogan, condemning the slogan wishing death to Modi. Congress speakers spoke to digging the grave of the PM at their party's rally. Entire Congress leadership was present. Nothing can be more shameful and unfortunate," he said, seeking apology amid chaotic scenes in the House.

In Rajya Sabha, ex-PM HD Deve Gowda said opposition parties would suffer if they were heard objecting to Rijiju's assertion. Priyanka Gandhi Vadra later rebuked the allegation, telling reporters in Parliament chamber after the adjournment that no one can do it! We will oppose our losses, and we will choose theirs.
