SC upholds man's will cutting off daughter for marrying 'outsider'

Says Testator's Wish Assumes Pre-eminence

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New Delhi: The string of landmark judgments on gender equality could not help Shyala Joseph get an equitable 1/9th share of the property of her father N S Sreedharan, who died in 2018, as in his will disbarred her for marrying outside the community.

A Supreme Court bench of Justices Ahsanuddin Aminullah and K Vinod Chandran reversed the concurrent findings of the HC and the trial court which had doubted the will and allowed equitable partition of Sreedharan's property among the nine children, including Shyala.

Writing the judgment, Justice Chandran said, "There can

be no interference to the will which stands proved unequivocally. The judgment and decree of the high court and that of the trial court stands set aside. The plaintiff (Shyala) is found to have no claim over the properties of her father, which by a will have been bequeathed to the other siblings of the plaintiff."

Once the SC doubted the claim, senior advocate P B Krish-

nan, appearing for Shyala, requested the bench that her entitlement was at best just 1/9th share of her father's assets which is a negligible portion of the properties. The bench said the question of equality does not arise in a case relating to the wish of a man about division and inheritance of his properties. It said, "We are not on equity, and the wish of the testator assumes pre-eminence. The

last will and testament of the testator cannot be disbarred from or frustrated." While allowing the appeal of her siblings, the bench ordered dismissal of the suit she had filed for equitable partition of her father's properties.

It said the rule of prudence cannot apply to the contents of a will, which is the wish of the individual who has absolute discretion to divide his properties.

If all siblings had been divested of their inheritance through a will, then the rule of prudence could not be applied by the courts, the bench said.

Referring to the reason for which Sreedharan had disbarred Shyala, the SC said, "There is a reason stated for such exclusion, the acceptability of which to our minds, is not what the rule of prudence dictates. We cannot put the testator in our shoes... We cannot substitute our opinions in place of that of the testator; his desire prompted by his own justifications."

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ED attaches ₹3,400 crore assets linked to Pearl group, promoter

New Delhi: As further action in a money laundering case, the Enforcement Directorate has attached properties worth over ₹3,400 crore linked to Pearl Agro Corporation Ltd (PACL) and its promoter Nirmal Singh Bhangoo in Ludhiana. The latter had allegedly collected over ₹8,000 crore from investors through a multi-level marketing scheme and laundered the proceeds to buy properties in India and overseas. The total attachment in the case now exceeds ₹8,500 crore, including some properties in Australia.

Investigation revealed that part of the funds mobilised from lakhs of investors were utilised for the acquisition of these 169 properties, currently valued at ₹3,365 crore, in the name of PACL. ED said on Thursday, "They have three charge sheets in this case so far."

Earlier in March, ED had arrested Bhangoo's son-in-law, Harjeet Singh Kalsi, who was allegedly behind laundering the proceeds of crime and buying properties worth over ₹8,000 crore in Australia, later attached by ED. ED's probe is based on an FIR registered by CBI against PACL, Nirmal Singh Bhangoo and others for their alleged involvement in fraudulent investment scheme.

Last year, ED had initiated restoration proceedings to return their lost money to nearly six crore investors.

Madurai: Tamil Nadu govt has not taken any opinion on the ownership of a stone pillar on the Thirupurankundram hill in Madurai district. It is not sure of what the structure is, advocate general P S Raman told Madras HC on Thursday. "There is no material or proof in the case now exceeds ₹8,500 crore, including some properties in Australia."

Why address babus as 'honourable', asks HC

Prayagraj: The Allahabad HC has questioned use of the term 'honourable' for bureaucrats and state govt officials and asked the principal secretary of UP's revenue department to file a petition to the court to abolish the authority of law that carries it.

The division bench of Justices Ajay Bhushan and Gurirama Prasad passed the order hearing a petition filed by Yogesh Sharma, when it asked why 'additional commissioner appeal' is referred to as 'Hon'ble additional commissioner appeal'.

"This is a subtle but certain way to diminish the status of constitutional authorities and courts. There is a recent trend where the ranks of various state officials from the lowest to the highest levels are being preceded with 'honourable' in correspondence as well as orders," the court observed.

Coast Guard detains 35 Bangla fishermen for entering Indian waters

Kolkata: Thirty-five Bangladeshi fishermen in two fishing trawlers were detained for allegedly illegally entering Indian waters, officials said. One trawler, FB Sabina-1, was carrying 11 fisherman while the other, FB Ruposi Sultan, was carrying the others, reports Monotosh Chakraborty.

Witnesses said Shyamal Das, the skipper of Indian trawler FB Saryanamay, spotted the vessels. Shortly after eight Indian fishing trawlers surrounded the two Bangladeshi vessels. Personnel from Coast Guard and Navy reached the spot and detained the two trawlers.

Sources said FB Ruposi Sultan allegedly did not have required documents and was involved in catching the banned sharkfish. The detained fisherman were handed over to Prasangjan police for legal action.

Stating that the prefix has to be used only for ministers and other sovereign functionaries, it said, "The same does not hold good for bureaucrats or officials of the state govt."

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The bench said, "This court notices that in official correspondence, there is a regular reference to different ranks of officials of the state with the word 'honourable' appended to their name. In this case, the divisional commissioner of Kanpur has been referred to by the collector, Etawah, as 'honourable' commissioner."

In a reply opposing Vasudeo's second bail plea, the police applied the sessions court hearing the bail plea, about the developments in the case. On Nov 26, the registrar (vigilance) of the Bombay HC's appellate side responded to the ACB's request, conveying the competent directive to proceed according to the law.

HC nod for action against Mumbai judge in graft case

Mumbai: In an alleged judicial corruption case, the Bombay HC granted permission to proceed against additional sessions judge Ejazuddin Saifuddin Kazmi. Subsequently, Kazmi's phone was seized by the ACB, a phone call was made to his lawyer, and a house search conducted in his presence. Kazmi is accused along with his court clerk Chandresh Vasudeo of seeking ₹15 lakh bribe from a litigant for a favourable order in a property dispute.

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Doctor couple's model that heals people and builds rural economy

They moved to remote Sittilingi in Tamil Nadu, built a hospital, then integrated 'backwards' into farming and crafts. Through organic farming, women-led producer companies and markets, they tackled malnutrition, debt and migration

In business, backwash integration means moving upstream to control one's inputs. In a small village in Tamil Nadu, that idea has been turned into an experiment in social medicine. Instead of stopping at curing illnesses in a ward, the Sittilingi Tribal Health Initiative (THI) has pushed steadily 'backwards' into farming, food and livelihoods, trying to change the conditions that make people sick in the first place.

What started off as a small effort, with two doctors encouraging four farmers to take up organic farming in 2005, is now a registered producer company, Sittilingi Organic Farmers Association (SOFA), with a turnover of Rs 3 crore.


The story begins in 1993, when a doctor couple, Dr Regi George and Dr Lalitha Regi, known locally as G and Tha, chose to work in Sittilingi, a remote valley in Dharmapuri district. The nearest town was about 80km away and the roughly 17,000 tribal residents had almost no access to formal healthcare. Drawing on Gandhian ideas of self-sufficiency, the couple decided any health system must be sustainable and be for and by the people themselves.

They started in a thatched mud hut, training local women as nurses and health workers who could prevent illness, recognise symptoms and treat common diseases. Over time, that hut became a 35-bed hospital with two operating theatres, an intensive care unit, a maternity ward, ultrasound and ECG facilities, a lab and even a blood storage unit. The results have been dramatic: infant mortality has fallen from among the highest in the state to 16 per 1,000 live births in 2019, and there have been no maternal deaths recorded in the valley in the last 20 years.

Many of the illnesses they treated could be traced to lives marked by debt, migration and poor diet.

Beyond The Hospital Walls

To understand what lay behind those illnesses, the doctors set out on a six-month *padayatra* in 2003, going from village to village. Behind the idyllic green facade of paddy fields and coconut groves, they found small farmers trapped in debt. Many

were borrowing from moneylenders to buy fertilisers and pesticides. When no one was in debt and who used chemical inputs, the same habits went up.

At the same time, traditional millet-based diets had been nudged aside by free polished rice from ration shops. Malnutrition and anaemia were common, especially among women and children. Debt pushed families to migrate to distant cities, where they lived in crowded, unsanitary conditions and often returned with tuberculosis and other infections. For G and

Tha, the link to health was obvious. Poor food, unstable livelihoods and forced migration were feeding disease. If they wanted lasting change, they would have to integrate treatment backwards into farming and the local economy.

The Organic Turn

The doctors began nudging farmers towards organic methods. In 2005, four farmers agreed to experiment, a bold step for families already in debt. The couple took them to visit organic farms in the region to interact with farmers already practising organic farming to help them understand methods and techniques in a language they could understand.

"We were lucky that agricultural scientist G Namakkal, father of the revival of organic farming in Tamil Nadu, came several times to talk to the farmers," Dr Regi recalls.

The logic was simple. Organic farming would reduce exposure to harmful chemicals, cut inputs costs, revive soils and bring back diverse, nutritious crops like millets. If conventional farming was pushing farmers into debt and out of the valley, a shift to organic,
